FEBRUARY WINTER TALK: This will be on February 19th and the topic will be the winter birds on our coastline, given by Anthony Knox who works for Hampshire County Council in our area. The talk will be an overview of the work Bird Aware Solent undertakes during the winter months to educate the public and help mitigate bird disturbance on our coastline. Our aim is to increase awareness of the wonderful array of overwintering birds that call the Solent home during the winter months and how we, as users of the coast, can help the birds thrive.

Note the start time of 19.00 hours. Coffee and biscuits afterwards.

JUNIOR SAILING 2025 - Recruiting More Young People!



The Sailing Committee is already planning next year's Junior Sailing programme with six fortnightly Sunday sessions between the end of April and mid- July leading up to Junior Sailing Week around the first week of the school summer holidays. Three further Sunday sessions are planned during September and October. The programme combines a mix of fun activities and informal training to develop young peoples' sailing skills whether they are beginners or already have some experience. We are hoping that, like last year, we will have leadership from both an external RYA instructor and from some of our own experienced club sailors.

Using the club's own fleet of dinghies which are suited to a range of abilities and with support boats always in attendance, our Junior Sailing is heavily subsidised by HCSC and offered at very low cost to children or grandchildren of HCSC members.

As one grandparent wrote to us after this year's Junior Sailing:

<u>COLD WATER SHOCK</u> This is a physiological reaction which takes place very quickly on immersion in the cold water. It can take your breath away, making you more likely to panic and increasing the likelihood of swallowing water. It is not hypothermia which takes longer to develop. It is dangerous. Please have a look at the RYA advice on their web site. Best of all avoid it by thinking before you go out on the water.
